# **Keeping our Community Safe and Looking Great**

Please ensure the community stays safe and looks great by following these guidelines from your Agreement, Exhibit D and Addendum to Exhibit D.

- 39. Storage. All driveway and patio areas must be free of excess items. All belongings, except patio furniture and barbecue grills, must be kept inside your unit. Any items left in public areas (other than decorations acceptable to OVI) will be removed by the maintenance staff.
- 3. Patios may only be extended with the permission of the Olympic Village board. Any alterations to patios without permission must be removed and the patios returned to the original specifications at the resident's expense. Patios and the exteriors and rears of residences are not to be used for storage of any items other than grills, patio furniture, lawn chairs or benches, and water hose containers. No portable storage units can be added.

### **Living Safely**

The holiday season is coming, and even we seniors are getting excited. It will be a chance to see family, decorate our homes, and perhaps attend some religious activities. It is also a season when we need to think about indoor safety.

Decorating and preparing more elaborate meals will require objects that we do not regularly use during the year. We often store such items on top shelves and in the back of shelves and closets. They may not be within easy reach, so we will need to get out a stepstool or a ladder to fetch them. We have

always done it, so maybe it doesn't seem like a big deal. But it is. Each year we get older, and our balance and strength decrease. Getting up onto something to reach an object or twisting to extract it from its storage place can easily lead to falls. Falls can produce sprains, broken bones, and even death if you hit your head on a hard object on the way down. Therefore, think safety. Ask younger family members to drop by to get those things down that you will need for the holiday celebration. If you are married, ask your spouse to help by taking objects you hand down and by steadying your position on the ladder. If single, ask a friend or a neighbor to come over

for a few minutes just to be there while you retrieve what you need. If you are alone and fall to the floor, you may have trouble getting to a phone to call for help because you are either injured or unconscious. Swallow your pride, ask for help, and live to enjoy many more holiday seasons.

During the holiday season, many people light candles for various reasons. Open flames are dangerous, particularly during a season when there are far more ignitable substances setting about than normal. All you need to have happen is a lighted match be dropped or a candle to fall over to quickly set neighboring items on fire. Therefore, you should always have platters or bowls under candles so that if one should tip over or a match drop while lighting them, the burning object will fall safely into the supporting vessel and not onto something flammable. Be careful if you have a wooden Christmas pyramid so that it does not stop turning when the candles are lit. This can cause the wooden vanes to get hot and start to burn. You should have a fire extinguisher. Know where it is, how to activate it, and point it at the base of the flames if you need to use it. You live in a building which also houses several other people. You would not want their holiday season ruined because

you were not careful with flames, and that caused a fire.

One of the pleasures of the holidays is the visit of grandchildren and great grandchildren. Still, such visits can be dangerous to those who are only a few years old. When you raised your own children, you undoubtedly "baby-proofed' your house to protect them. You probably have not done that to your residence in Olympic Village. Young ones are still prone to stick objects into electric outlets, put unfamiliar things into their mouths, try to pull themselves up on tablecloths, or to climb up furniture, drawers and shelves. They can pull these over onto themselves and become injured; they need close watching. In particular, young kids and open flames do not go together - ever!

Dear Olympic Village Resident:

The Board of Directors of Olympic Village has reviewed and approved budgets for the upcoming fiscal year. The Resident Finance Committee and Board Members involved in the budget process worked to keep expenses down and address some of the items that have needed attention over the years. While the budget does not address all community concerns this fiscal year, it is a step in the right direction and lays the groundwork to manage those concerns over the next few years. This is one of the goals of the long range planning process.

The Resident Monthly Fee will increase \$30.00 to \$565.00 per month.

- Monthly Operating Fee \$450.00 per month
- PMS will be \$15.00 per month.
- Facility Fund will be \$100.00 per month.

The monthly assessment for PMS (Payment for Municipal Services) and the provision for the Facility Fund will be separately identified on the monthly bills. The PMS fee is the City of Sun Prairie charge for municipal services. The Facility Fund provision is a requirement of our loan agreement with Starion Bank. This Fund will provide reserves for the timely and orderly repair and replacement of the Olympic Village units (such as furnaces, flooring, roofs, driveways and windows). This is necessary to minimize the risk to residents of special assessments, deferred maintenance, or unfunded losses. Facility Funds are part of a long-term financial plan that helps strengthen Olympic Village's fiscal health and increase the market value of the units.
