# **Living Safely**

The holiday season is over, and now we need to clean things up. We have the same problem we did before the holidays, only in reverse. We need to put those decorations and kitchenware that we got down back onto those higher shelves and into those back corners of shelves and closets. Once again, we must be concerned about falling off a stepstool or a ladder. We are just as likely falling putting things back as getting them down. Therefore, think safety. As before the holidays, ask younger family members to drop by to put things away. If you are married, ask your spouse to help by handing you objects and by steadying your position on the ladder. If single, ask a friend or a neighbor to come over for a few minutes just to be there while you are storing things. If you are alone and fall to the floor, you may have trouble getting to a phone to call for help because you are either injured or unconscious. Swallow your pride, ask for help, and avoid spending the rest of the winter in rehab.

It appears that we are going to have a goodly amount of winter this year. At one time, that meant fun in the snow and skating on the ponds for all of us. As we have aged, however, it has more frequently meant slipping on the ice and falling, often hurting more parts of us than we would like. Ice can be tricky,

sometimes being hard to see even in the daylight. Therefore, please take precautions every time you walk out of your unit. If there is any chance of ice on the path on which you plan to walk, use ski poles or walking sticks with sharp points. Rubber tips do not hold on ice but can slide away just as you put weight on them. You need something that will poke into the ice. Better yet, get a pair of Yak Tracks to put on your shoes or boots. They are a nuisance to put on and take off, but they cut into the ice and will not slide. The last words many people say before they fall on their fannies or more breakable parts are, "It's only a few steps. I'll be fine." Always take a cell phone with you when you go out in icy conditions and do not put it in your back pocket because, if you land on it, you will damage both you and it. Going slowly and being extra careful costs you a lot less than a fall.

Finally, keep a blanket and emergency supplies in your vehicle where you can easily get to them. If your vehicle gets stuck or disabled, you need to keep warm until help comes. Also, have a way of contacting emergency help along with you, and think at least twice before driving into the countryside alone when the windchill is below zero, and at least three times if it is also after dark.

### **FREE** Covid Test Kits

It seems there is a resurgence of Covid related illnesses, not only here in Olympic Village but all across the nation as well.

For those who may need test kits you can now order **FREE athome COVID-19 test kits** (4 per household) through the *COVID.gov* website. If you need help placing an order for your at-home tests call 1-800-232-0233.

This website also contains information on 'some' brands and 'some' lots of older test kits which are past the expiration date printed on the package. Per a local pharmacist, you should not rely on the results from expired test kits that have not been 'officially' extended per the website listings.

If you have health insurance through an employer, the Marketplace, Medicare, or Medicaid, your insurance will pay for 8 at-home tests each month for each person on your plan.


