Requests for Improvement

Per the Resident Agreements, residents of OVI cannot alter the interior or exterior of their unit without formal approval from the Residential Community Manager.

To inquire for project approval, please submit an Exhibit J: Request for Improvement before you start a project in or outside of your unit. If you need a copy of the form, you can find them in your Resident Agreements, on the Portal, or contact Janelle Taylor, RCM.

To alter the interior or exterior of your unit without prior approval is an intentional breach of the Resident Agreement, which can result in financial liabilities and involuntary termination of the Resident Agreement.

Announcements from the OVI Board of Directors

Stump Grinding

There has been extensive research and discussion this year involving the landscape committee, AAMS, outside contractors, and the OVI Board of Directors all in regards to stump grinding/removal at Olympic Village. In these discussions it has become apparent that some stumps, particularly those from the arbor vitae, are in locations that will be difficult to navigate for contractors and thus, incredibly expensive to remove.

What we have found, is that the stumps located in the planting areas close to the units could cause further damage to siding and concrete if removed. Additionally, contractors have noted that the rock beds are damaging to their equipment. Even if the surface rocks are removed, the rocks are now embedded in the root systems of the stumps.

There is an ongoing effort between AAMS and OVI to address a large amount of deferred interior and exterior maintenance that was mismanaged over the years. Some of these items we have been able to address proactively and others come unexpectedly. Due to this the Board of Directors is required to take caution when approving funds.

At this time, a decision has been made regarding stump removal. Arbor Vitae and other stump removal in the unit planting areas will not be performed by OVI due to safety and cost issues. Discussion regarding stump removal in open areas is ongoing. We will continue to investigate alternative options to provide the best landscaping services possible.

Safety Article

It has been unusually hot this summer, and the heat seems to keep going on and on. Yet, we know Wisconsin weather, and the cold and snow will be with us before we are aware if we do not prepare.

One of the things that must be done in preparation for fall is cleaning out the gardens and flowerpots around our living units. If you have planted little, this will be simple. However, if you have more extensive plantings, it may take you longer and be harder than you remember from previous years to clean everything up. Aging makes life more difficult in so many ways. Therefore, plan enough time to tidy things up so that you do not feel pressured by approaching cold weather to try to do too much too quickly, and injure yourself in the process. Then too, you will need a place to put the things you bring in from outside, and your garage seems to get smaller every year. It might be a good idea to clean out your garage before dismantling your gardens. If you have family members who can help, do not be shy about asking for that help. They want you to be with them for many years to come, so they should be willing to do some of the heavy lifting for you.

This time of year brings out hostile critters, such as yellow-jackets, so be careful not to get stung. Try not to provide them with a friendly environment in which to feed and breed. Other creatures, such as ants, will soon be looking for a comfortable place to spend the winter. If you find that your unit has been invaded by creepy things planning to make it their version of Florida, contact the RCM so they can be dealt with before they do serious damage.
